

Reading in KS2

Inspiring a love of books is one of the best ways to prepare children for a lifetime of learning and enjoyment through reading. It will bring huge benefits at school and beyond, because being able to read early on helps children to understand language, making it easier for them to learn to read themselves later on. As children get older, there's no need to stop enjoying sharing books and reading together.

Research has shown that children who enjoy reading and spend more time reading for pleasure have better reading and writing skills, a broader vocabulary and an increased general knowledge and understanding of other cultures.


Here are some tips for promoting reading at home with older children.

- Ensure that your child sees you reading. It doesn't matter if it is the newspaper, a magazine or a cookery book any reading material is fine!
- **Keep reading together**. Read anything jokes, riddles, poems-it doesn't matter! Take it in turns to read paragraphs. All children, however fluent a reader, will benefit from hearing an adult read to them.
- **Encourage your child to join in**. Ask your child to read a recipe while you cook or the TV listings to find a programme.
- Give book tokens as presents and ask others to do the same.
- Visit the local library together so you can both choose books. Discuss your choices.
- Encourage your child to carry a book at all times so they can read in spare moments car journeys, waiting at the dentist.
- **Go to libraries and bookshops when authors are visiting.** Children love to meet their favourite writers.
- Follow authors on twitter some are amazing at connecting with their readers.
- Make sure your home is a reading home. Try to have a family bookshelf and make sure there are shelves in your child's bedroom as well.
