Design criteria	A set of rules to help you with your ideas and test the success of them.	
Evaluation	When you look at the good and bad points about something, then think about how you could improve it.	
Net	A flat 2D shape, that can become a 3D shape once assembled.	
Stable	Object does not easily topple over.	
Strong	It doesn't break easily.	
Structure	Something that has been made and put together. For example, a building, bridge, chair, table.	
Test	To find out whether something works as it should.	
Weak	It breaks easily.	
Windmill	A structure with sails that are moved by wind.	
Windmill axle	The point from which the turbine or sails move.	
Windmill structure	The part that makes the windmill stand up.	
Windmill turbine	The parts that move in the wind.

# Animals including humans

How can animals be classified?

sight	Your eyes let you see all the things around you.
hearing	Your ears let you listen to all the things around you. Your brain is able to tell what different sounds are.
touch	Your skin gives you the sense of touch. You can tell if something is warm, cold, smooth or rough without even looking at it!
taste	Your sense of taste comes from your tongue. You can tell if something tastes bitter or sweet. You might have some tastes you like and some you don't.
smell	You smell using your nose. Your nose can tell if things smell nice or not nice.



## Key Vocabulary:

Mammals Mammals are animals that breathe air, are warm blooded, grow hair

or fur, and drink milk as a baby. They are vertebrates.

Amphibians Animals that live in water when they are born and on land as they

grow older. They start with gills before developing lungs. They are

cold-blooded.

Birds Animals that have feathers, wings, beaks and lay eggs. They are

vertebrates and warm blooded.

Fish Animals that live in water and breathe using gills. They have fins to

swim and are covered in scales. They are cold blooded.

**Reptiles** Animals that **breathe air**, are covered in **scales** and **lay eggs**. They are

cold blooded.

**Invertebrates** Animals that **do not have a backbone**. Many have a shell, or carapace,

instead. They can be found on land or in water e.g. crabs, ladybirds,

bees, shrimp

**Vertebrates** Animals that **have a backbone**.

**Carnivore** Animals that mostly eat **meat** (other animals).

Herbivore Animals that only eat plants.

Omnivore Animals that eat both plants and meat (other animals).
